<b>Goyder's Camp (site) and Hughes Avenue</b>	NT	archaeological site	historic, social	Development and devaluation	Devaluation	suffering	Goyder's campsite and Hughes Avenue (the connecting road to the top of the escarpment) are the earliest record of European settlement in Darwin and are highly significant to its history and heritage. Goyder established the first successful settlement (then known as Palmerston) in February 1869 and Hughes Ave follows the exact route of the road he created to the top of the escarpment. For many years the site was hidden by port activities, but now has the potential to be interpreted under sensitive development of the port. <b>Mangrove foreshore of Darwin Harbour</b>	NT	ecological landscape	ecological, scientific, indigenous	development	Devaluation, destruction	suffering	Darwin's foreshore mangrove communities are part of one of the largest single stands of mangroves in the country and as such are nationally important (Hanley 1992a). Threats from development of Darwin Harbour include vegetation clearance, tidal flat drainage, altered drainage patterns, extractive industries, port operations, sewage outfalls, stormwater drains and surface runoff. Any mangrove loss should be accompanied by attempts to maintain productivity levels and a range of all mangrove habitat types. . There is a very real danger that the current mosaic of development will lead to a significant loss of mangrove productivity and habitat similar to that seen elsewhere in Australia.	Mangroves to be conserved and protected and productivity levels to be sustained. A management plan for mangroves to be developed.
